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Message from Turlough O'Brien, CEO of Tinteán

Tinteán was established in 1993 and is now an important provider of social housing within the county. We take pride in the standard of housing we provide for our tenants. We are also proud of the relationships we have developed with our partners, our tenants and the wider community including Carlow local authorities, Delta, Irish Council for Social Housing and the Department of Environment, Community and Local Government.

Beginning with one scheme for the elderly in our community, Tinteán has addressed the housing needs of those in most need and those with special needs to a very high standard.

of pride. Tinteán provides affordable homes for low income families in which rents are linked to income while maintaining all the homes to the highest standard.

Housing associations like Tinteán are independent, not-forprofit charities that provide affordable

high quality housing for people who cannot afford to buy their own home or pay for private rented housing.

There are currently nearly 90,000 households on local authority waiting lists for social housing. In recent years Government funding has been greatly reduced. At a time of a growing need for social housing, Tinteán's work has never been more important. That is the challenge facing Tinteán and one we look forward to addressing in the new environment where the voluntary housing sector is being asked to play a greater part in the provision of social housing.

In the past, local authorities provided nearly all social housing. However in recent years, housing association provision has increased greatly, and during the last ten years, housing

associations have provided a quarter of all new social housing.

Social housing makes up 10% of all housing in Ireland. 500



housing associations provide 27,000 housing tenancies.

We operate as efficiently and effectively as possible and aim to ensure that our financial stewardship is of the highest standard.

We work with partners who share a similar mission and apply corporate instruments such as private finance to respond creatively and

effectively to the huge demand for social housing in Ireland.

It is highly significant that Tinteán is the fifth organisation to obtain Certified Borrower Status from the Housing Finance Agency and positions Tinteán to continue to address the need for social housing in the changed financial landscape affecting housing provision in Ireland today and into the future. We are constantly looking for viable opportunities that address the evident social need and that make financial sense for Tinteán.

Looking ahead, Tinteán's aims will be to work in partnership with stakeholders and communities to offer people an opportunity to find a good home they can afford.

We want to create neighbourhoods of choice, where people want to live and settle in. In doing this we want to get more for less in everything we do by securing best value.

We see ourselves playing our part in innovative ways to help create new, balanced, vibrant and popular places.

A BRIEF HISTORY OF TINTEÁN

In 1991 a small group of volunteers from St Catherine's Community Centre in Carlow attended a Community Development course in conjunction with St Patrick's College Maynooth. During the course a number of needs were identified for the Carlow area, with housing identified as one of the key needs.

The following year, with support from the Irish Council for Social Housing (ICSH), Respond Housing Association and Carlow Local Authority Officials, the group worked to create Carlow Voluntary Housing Association Ltd., a voluntary housing body which would subsequently trade under the name of Tinteán.

Since it's establishment twenty one years ago Tinteán has developed housing for low income families, single people, older people and people with disabilities in Carlow Town and County. Delta provides the care and

support services to people with disabilities living in Tinteán accommodation in the community.

Tinteán comes from the Irish seanf-hocail or saying, 'níl aon tinteán mar do thinteán féin' which means ' there's no fireside like your own fireside' – there is no place like home! The fireside are at the heart of the Irish home and Tinteán recognises that quality housing is at the heart of creating sustainable communities. Tinteán currently provide ninety nine units of accommodation with further proposed projects at various stages from construction to feasibility.

HOW IS TINTEÁN FUNDED?

Tinteán raised seed capital for the organisation by participating in the Éire

Óg draw in 1993/1994. This successful draw enabled Tintean to raise £17,788, which helped the idea of homes for people become a reality. In the light of today's costs this amount seems small, but it was the starting point for what Tinteán is today.

The funding for Tinteán up to now has come via Carlow County Council from two schemes administered by the Department of Environment, Heritage and Local Government.

They are:

- Capital Assistance Scheme
- 2. Capital Loan and Subsidy Scheme

Through these schemes and support from the local community Tintean continues to assist in the provision of social housing in County Carlow.

This funding model has now changed and we will operate in a much more challenging environment.

Tinteán is affiliated to the Irish Council for Social Housing and the County Carlow Community Network.

HOUSING POLICY OF TINTEÁN

Applicants are assessed according to any or all of the following indicators:

- 1. Applicants who are homeless or shelter less.
- 2. Applicants whose names are on the Local Authority Housing Lists, or who have statutory rights to be housed.
- 3. Applicants who because of age, infirmity, ill-health, overcrowding, unfit housing conditions, or other irremediable causes, find their present living circumstances particularly distressing.
- 4. Applicants who are householders, or whose families own the houses in which the applicants are the sole

occupiers, may be considered if the applicants or their families cover the local contribution of the cost, provided that the applicant would otherwise qualify under 3 above.

- 5. The need for proper housing will be the over-riding factor in Tintean's assessment.
- 6. The ability of the applicant to live harmoniously with other tenants will be a factor in assessing the application.

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'Home' From A Tinteán Tenant's Perspective

No place like home for Carmel

The name of Tinteán comes from the Irish saying 'níl aon tinteán mar do thinteán féin' or 'there's no fire place like your own fire place'.

Carmel Stenson is one resident who can testify to that expression. Carmel was one of the first residents in Tinteán's maiden development in Radharc Oisín when it opened in 1995. Carmel's husband had passed away and she had reared her eight children.

She saw the homes were being built and thought they may suit her. Her independence was of keen importance to her.

"I thought how lucky I'd be if I got one, I'd continue to be independent. I'd be near the church, St Fiacc's House and the shops. I was extremely lucky to get one."

It was initially strange moving in on her

own, the first time in years but Radharc Oisín quickly became home.

"As time went on it was very easy to call here home. I'm still very blessed to have my children come frequently but they don't feel they have to come everyday, I wouldn't want that. My independence mattered to me a lot in everyway. In that way I am independent."

During the week, Carmel would have visits from friends and family, do her errands and have dinner in St Fiacc's House. Carmel lauded the staff in St Fiacc's House.

In the evenings, she'd read the paper or watches the news. She is free and independent to do what she wants when she wants.

Carmel said she has good neigh-

bours that could not be improved upon and who are there if needed.

Without Tinteán, Carmel said: "I wouldn't like to think where I'd be, I would not. I would be very fearful where I'd be."

Tinteán has always been "very, very helpful" according to Carmel. Recently her house was upgraded with new doors and insulation. A Tinteán representative visited the estate to fully explain the work to be done and there was minimum fuss.

"If we want any help we know who to ring and if we are in any doubt whatsoever we can ring the office. There always there for us. I could not say enough in their favour, I really couldn't."



Q & A with Claire & Eugene Malone



How did you hear about Tinteán?

The first we heard of Tinteán was when Claire seen an advertisement for a vacant property that had been advertised in the newspaper by Tinteán. We had never heard of Tinteán before this.

How did you find the application process?

We found the application process easy, the application form was easy to complete and the cover letter explained where and when the form was to be submitted.

How did you find the interview process?

We had no problems with the interview process, the interview panel were very nice and informative and answered any questions that we had in relation to the property and what steps would be taken in letting the property.

How have you and your family settled in to your new home and community?

We have settled in great, it's been magic, we love our new home and are getting on very well with our new neighbours, we all look out for each other and we feel right at home.

Does your new home and community provide for your family's needs?

Yes our new home has given us everything we need, before this we were very isolated in the country.

How have you found Tinteán in dealing with maintenance or other issues that have arisen in your time as a Tinteán tenant?

We have had no problems with Tinteán dealing with any issues that has arisen in our time as tenants.

Would you recommend Tinteán as a housing provider if asked?

Yes, definitely.

Explain what benefits getting a Tinteán House has meant to you and your family?

Getting a Tinteán house has given us the security of having a permanent home to call our own and peace of mind to be part of a community and not isolated in the country.

How would you define your move to Tinteán Phadraig in one sentence?

I suppose we would define our move as coming home.

he difference Tinteán has made to the lives of its tenants is both profound and very real over the last 21 years. It has provided homes to people who simply would not have them. These include low income families, the elderly and people with special needs. There are around 100 men, women and children in Carlow that call a Tinteán property their home.

Tinteán Chairperson Eileen Brophy is known throughout Carlow with her work for people with special needs. She explained: "The driving force behind Tinteán would be the housing need that's there. For me personally, the focus is that we have 35 people in accommodation with learning disabilities in Carlow now which would not have been thought of before. Some of them are living semi-independently and will move on in the next few years for independent living."

Tinteán has also supported people to progress from social housing. If a low income tenant's situation improves to the point where they can afford a mortgage, Tinteán offer encouragement and even contribute a "pay-back" to the tenant from the rent they have paid.

"We recently gave over €12,000 for a family to go towards a mortgage and deposit for a new home," she said. "We had a house then for someone on the lower step starting out. That is the beauty of what we have."

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"We can be the catalyst for them to move forward onto home ownership and then we can bring somebody else in and start them off again. It what keeps us going as directors really."

There are no honorariums for directors; the board is completely voluntary and the management was

Tinteán also assists people who may not be able to

avail of social housing through the local authority's social housing list.

In some cases, elderly people can live alone in their family and may not qualify for the housing list. Years ago Tinteán dealt with a case of an elderly woman in Graiguecullen who lived in unsuitable conditions in the family home. The woman hadn't

been upstairs in the four-bed property for years and used a bucket for a toilet.

"It was great for us to be able to assist her. The

house was no good to her. She had two rooms she lived in and that was it," explained Eileen.

In another case an elderly woman had no running water and had to rely on family members or walk two miles laden with buckets to collect water. Again Tinteán were able to assist the woman.

The tri-part partnership Tinteán has developed with the HSE, Carlow Co Council and Delta Centre has been vital over the last 21 years. In this respect Eileen acknowledges the partnership has been instrumental in providing new homes to 34 of Delta Centre residents in recent years.

Tinteán can home people referred from the council's housing list while also providing homes to people that the council cannot.

The capital funding Tinteán accesses also comes via Carlow Co Council through the Department of Environment, Heritage and Local Government. The HSE provides funding for care for residents with special needs which is then carried out by the Delta Centre.

Of course Tinteán works with other groups like MABS. Recently, Tinteán also worked with the St Vincent de Paul Hospice to home two elderly men.

"That was a brave step; we were prepared to put the supports there and St Vincent de Paul were

prepared to the put the supports there to enable those people to have at long last a home of their own."

Tenants are eager to show their appreciation to Tinteán. One elderly man

was eager to pay his rent paid a full 12 months in advance. In the first development, Radharc Oisin in Graiguecullen, Eileen said there was always an open invitation for a cup of tea and a chat.

The service Tinteán provides is priceless to its tenants – the security of having their own place. "Your home is your castle," said Eileen. "Once you close that door it's yours. It's really good that people are secure in the knowledge once they're in there, it's theirs."

Radharc Oisín, Graiguecullen

Radharc Oisín, Gráiguecullen was completed in 1995 and officially opened in October to cater for the elderly and is a 12 unit scheme consisting of 9 one bedroom units and 3 two bedroom units.

Tinteán Phádraig, Chapel Street, Tullow

Tinteán Phádraig, Chapel Street, Tullow was completed in 1997 to cater for the elderly and is an 8 unit scheme consisting of 6 one bedroom units and 2 two bedroom units. It was extended in 2006/2007 with the addition of an extra



4 x 2 bed units for the elderly.



Tinteán Risigh, Dublin Road, Carlow

Tinteán Risigh, Dublin Road, Carlow was also completed in 1997 to cater for families and is a 10 unit scheme consisting of 10 three bedroom houses.

Tinteán Dara, Oak Park, Carlow

Tinteán Dara, Oak Park, Carlow came on stream in 2001 to cater for tenants with special needs. Tinteán Dara provides accommodation for 6 tenants and a House Parent





Teach Tinteán, Blackbog Grove, Carlow

Is the most recent development by Carlow Voluntary Housing Association and it has just been officially opened. This magnificent residence houses special needs tenants and a House Parent.



Tinteán Carraig, Ballinacarrig, Carlow

was completed in 2004 to cater for tenants with special needs. Tinteán Carraig provides accommodation for six tenants with special needs and a House Parent.



Tinteán Coille, Pollerton Big Carlow

was completed in 2005. It comprises two units for seven tenants with special needs and a House Parent, twenty units (18x3 bed semis and 2x2 bed one story semis) for families plus one unit for seven tenants with special needs plus two House Parents. Tinteán Community Centre completes the development.



Tinteán Eala, Oak Park, Carlow

This adapted and re-furbished house, which opened in 2012, provides a high standard of accommodation in the community for four people with intellectual disabilities, plus a house parent from Delta. Each resident has their own bedroom and there are excellent communal facilities plus landscaped gardens.



Tinteán Rua, Browneshill Walk Carlow

Opened in 2008. It was achieved by the purchase of the four bedroom detached residence formally known as "Delmara" and It was fully upgraded and renovated to accommodate its three tenants and a House Parent.

Michael is a trained primary School teacher and worked in teaching for forty years before retiring in 2001. He has also worked as an elected representative since







ver the last 21 years, Tinteán Carlow Voluntary Housing Association has significantly expanded their range of housing and related services to people in housing need in Carlow.

The people of Carlow should be rightly proud of the work that the housing association has undertaken to improve the lives of people and communities in the county in both urban and rural areas.

It is a fine example of a housing association working in strong partnership with a range of statutory and voluntary organisations to collectively meet the housing needs of the people of Carlow including families, older people, people with disabilities and homeless persons. Tinteán has grown as a part of growing voluntary housing sector,

that emerged over the last 20 years and Tinteán have contributed significantly on a national level to the development of an active voluntary housing movement in Ireland providing new types of housing options.

The Tinteán board have been active in the wider housing sector with Tinteán Board Members, particularly Eileen Brophy and Frank Comerford, who have been recognised in the sectors National Board Member awards in recent years.

In 1995, the voluntary housing sector managed around 9,000 homes for families, older people, people with disabilities and formerly

homeless households. By 2014, housing associations collectively managed around 27,000 homes throughout the country in both urban and rural areas.

Housing associations who are members of the Irish Council for Social Housing (ICSH) are now active in every local authority in the country. Many housing associations are locally based housing associations that may have provided one-off projects to meet a local or parish need. However, Tinteán have now emerged, since their establishment, to provide a range of projects throughout the county often as part of mixed and thriving communities

There are only a small number of larger housing associations who operate on a nationwide basis in Ireland. Whilst larger housing associations provide over 300 homes, a few housing associations manage a few thousand

However, another steady

growing model that has been emerging in the voluntary housing sector is that of the county or regionally focused housing associations,

> as Tinteán in the southeast.

What is evident in the development of voluntary housing associations has been the leadership role of the various boards in underfor Social Housing taking new innovations in providing new types taking new innovations of housing.

This can been seen in the appetite and initiative the then Board of Tinteán showed in the mid-1990s with the use of a new and quite complicated capital funding scheme for housing families. then known as the rental subsidy

with disabilities. This has been often a concern of many families on what will be the supported options of their love ones into the future. Again, Tinteán, in partnership with Delta decided to address this real need

One thing we at the ICSH can say is that Tinteán have built on a strong foundation on the initial vision and can do approach of the Board from 1993. The fact that Tinteán have now received certified status in 2014 from the Housing Finance Agency (HFA) for lending purposes is a testament to how strongly that the association is governed. Tinteán is the first non-large housing association to achieve this status and the HFA have a rigorous

> due diligence assessment. The successful expansion of the association has also allowed it to employ skilled staff to assist the board to meet its objectives. Tinteán

have seen the good times with Government capital funding schemes, and then real challenges over the past 6 years, no doubt in the next 21 years the funding environment will change further, especially with increased use of loan finance and associated regu-

About ICSH

The Irish Council for Social Housing (ICSH) was formed in 1982 by housing and hostel organisations in Ireland to act as a national representative, promotional, information and advisory federation.

The ICSH seeks to encourage and assist the development of a range of social housing services which complements the role of the Local Housing Authorities and meet the different and changing needs of various groups of the population such as the elderly, homeless, people with disabilities or families on low incomes.

The main objectives of the ICSH are:

- 1. Promotion of non-profit/Voluntary Housing for the relief of housing need and homelessness.
- 2. Acting as a representative body for affiliated members.
- 3. Facilitating the exchange of information amongst members in relation to planning, provision and management of social housing.
- Provision of information, advice, guidance, education, training and research.

The people of Carlow should be rightly proud of the work that the housing association has undertaken to improve the lives of people and communities in the county in both urban and rural areas

For a voluntary board, this was a significant administrative challenge However, Tinteán were one of the first locally based housing associations to successfully use this scheme to provide necessary housing to the families on Carlow local authority waiting lists.

Tinteán also pioneered, in partnership with Delta, the provision of supported housing for people with disabilities. It was an often overlooked housing need, but a real lifeline to the parents and friends of people

Tinteán well positioned for bright future

The provision of social housing in Ireland has never been more crucial and Tinteán are well positioned to continue to affect people's lives for the better.

Tinteán is renowned in the sector for the management structures, such that its directors are often asked to give talks to other similar groups and bodies around the country. Tinteán is also only the fifth group to secure an Approved **Borrower Status** under the Housing Finance Agency (HFA). To date, it's also the only small housing group in the country to achieve this status.

This resulted from a rigorous assessment of the group's finances. It's an endorsement for the way Tinteán is run but it's also crucial as funding streams

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change and more emphasis is put on loans from the HFA or other loans to fund new developments.

Prudent financial management has been essential for Tinteán and how it started out 21 years with focus on the first development, Radharc Oisín in Graiguecullen.

Honorary Treasurer Frank Comerford recalls how the group did

not put the cart before the horse when it launched its first scheme 21 vears ago.

"It was a question of let's do one and see how it goes. Once you got one up and running, and our income stream that gave you more capital to go for two and then for three.

It's this prudence that now sees Tinteán with a housing stock of seven million euro and a capital of one million euro.

Capital Advance Leasing Facility (CALF) is a recently introduced funding model with a maximum of 30%

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secured through a government loan and 70% has to be raised privately or through a

commercial loan

or the HFA.

Another challenge has been the reduction in another grant scheme the Capital Assistance Scheme which is a targeted scheme to specific categories of need.

"It's a big change for the voluntary housing sector in terms of risk management whereas before

we were just into management. That's where HFA approval came in. Nobody is going to loan to you unless vou are a bloody good company," said Frank.

The financial prudence does not come at the expense of quality homes and there is a focus on having the homes as energy efficient as possible including existing housing stock.

Tinteán Padraig and Radharc Oisín have seen upgrades recently in the form of new attic insulation, heating upgrades, new windows and doors. 

Since its inception in 1993. Tinteán has been instrumental in providing accommodation for the most vulnerable in our society in County Carlow.

Funding for Voluntary Schemes has been provided via the Council from the Department of the Environment, Community and Local Government for the following:

(a) General housing need, and, (b) Those with special needs.

Tinteán are required to fund raise for special needs accommodation and have always been able to meet this requirement. To date in excess of €7.6m has been expended on projects by Tinteán which includes 64 units accommodating in excess of 150 people.


The range of accommodation provided includes general social housing, housing for the elderly, special needs and community homes. Tinteán has a very strong community ethos and the design of schemes (usually 10 - 20 homes) lends itself to building strong inclusive communities. This brings security and stability to the lives of those who reside

Tinteán has schemes located in both Carlow Town & Tullow. They also had a proposal for a scheme in Tinryland which, due to the economic downturn, was put on hold. The proposal included a mixture of social, special need, elderly and private housing. We look forward to reviewing this proposal should finance be available in the coming years.

Being a local Voluntary Association, Tinteán, is in touch with the needs of Communities in Carlow and this is evident in the high level of occupancy in all their schemes. Tinteán further have policies and procedures in relation to management and maintenance of their tenancies. In relation to maintenance, they specify call-out times depending on the nature of repair required - adherence to these procedures is evident in the high standards which they maintain in their

Another example of the positive working relationship between the Council and Tinteán is in the Area Based / Energy (including 72 Council and 20 Tinteán) to improve energy efficiency for occupants. Proposed works included roof insulation, wall insulation, high efficiency boilers. Window and door replacement as necessary and CFL bulbs. Works have now been completed to a very high standard and will result in substantial energy savings to the tenants.

Tinteán has a long association with the Delta Centre, Strawhall, Carlow and has provided supported accommodation for many service users over the years. The Council is particularly happy to support funding for such schemes, which allow individuals to develop independence in their day to day lives. It also provides security for their accommodation for



Poor Homes Scheme funded by Sustainable Energy Ireland for energy upgrades to Local Authority and Voluntary Housing stock. Following consultation with Tinteán and other voluntary housing associations, a joint application was submitted for works on 115 housing units future years as their own families mature. This year a limited amount of voluntary

housing funding was made available by the Department of the Environment Community & Local Government for voluntary construction projects. Applications were received from a number of

Voluntary Groups and prioritised in accordance with the Department's criteria. The Council received funding for one project, a group home - Tinteán Carrig Phase II, located in Ballinacarrig, Wexford Road, Carlow. I understand budget approval to proceed to tender has just now been received and I look forward to the commencement of the project in early 2015.

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The Passive House design approach to Tintean Carraig

Consulting Architect Emma Geoghegan MRIAI ARB from MEME Architecture outlines the low energy and environmentally sustainable brief for this development

Tinteán currently provide residential accommodation for four adults in an existing bungalow on a site in Ballinacarrig on the Wexford Road. In 2015 a second phase of development is planned for the site which will encompass a new purpose built house built to Passive House standards providing a home for 6 additional residents. Planning permission was granted for the development by Carlow County Council in 2013 and is currently at detailed design stage.

The concept behind the proposed development is to create a landscaped courtyard between the existing house and the new house which will provide a private area for the residents. As the surrounding context is generally large scale retail or industrial buildings it was important to

create a new visual amenity space which the new house could relate to and the courtyard garden will provide this.

From the outset Tinteán were keen to ensure that the new house would be as low

energy and environmentally sustainable as possible and the decision was made that the new Ballinacarrig building should be designed and built to achieve a Passive House standard.

This standard is an internationally accepted best practice approach to low energy design and requires a building to be super insulated and airtight to reduce space heating demands to such a low level that a conventional heating system may not be required. The key criteria in the

In deciding to take this approach for their newest housing unit, Tinteán are demonstrating that they are at the forefront of social housing provision

> design of a Passive House are maximisation of solar gains, high levels of insulation and airtightness and use of an efficient MVHR (mechanical ventilation and heat recovery) system. The early decision by

Tinteán to adopt this approach allowed the design team to determine the optimum design for the building which would meet both the requirements of the residents and also comply with the exacting standards of Passive House design.

Over the last number of years the Passive House design approach has become very popular for individual houses in Ireland.

However there are so far few examples of social housing developments adopting this rigorous design standard.

In fact the first certified Passive House social housing development on the island was only completed in Dungannon, Co Tyrone in 2012. In deciding to take this approach for their newest housing unit, Tinteán are demonstrating that they are at the forefront of social housing provision.

'The project was designed with the assistance of Integrated Energy Passive

House Design Consultants.

The project team comprises Meme Architecture, Bowe Consulting Engineers, Galileo Energy and Brennan Associates Cost Consultants.'
